Get an early start on your college education!

By participating in the University of Valley Forge's (UVF) Dual Enrollment program, high school juniors and seniors can earn college credits while fulfilling high school requirements. Dual Enrollment students will take courses **COMPLETELY ONLINE**, interacting with the university's professors and current students.

Get the most out of college before you graduate high school!

Dual Enrollment students can take up to 24 credits through the University of Valley Forge – the equivalent of your first year of college! Students can take up to two courses (6 credits) during a semester (summer, fall, or spring).

Any student who completes four courses (12 credits), through UVF Dual Enrollment will receive a **\$2,000 SCHOLARSHIP** if they choose to attend Valley Forge upon high school graduation.

Admissions Requirements

In order to be accepted into the Dual Enrollment program at the University of Valley Forge, students must qualify in all of the following criteria: The student must

- complete and submit a dual enrollment application (this application can be found at valleyforge.edu/dualenrollment)
- mail in official high school transcripts**
- have a cumulative high school GPA of 2.5 or higher
- complete sophomore year of high school (high school graduates are no longer eligible)

Course Organization

Dual Enrollment courses are offered completely online over a 16-week semester. Students are expected to review their syllabi at the beginning of each semester to gain an understanding of expectations, assignments, and projects for each course. Students will engage in class discussions, instructional videos, and research resources during the 16-week period. There is no designated time that a student is required to log on.

Dual Enrollment courses are fully accredited, general education courses.

Dual Enrollment Courses

ENG 123 College Writing and Research

3 credits

This course stresses the writing process and introduces the skills necessary to conduct college-level research. Emphasis is placed on argumentative and analytical writing supported by research. *A passing grade of C- or higher is required. Students will receive a final grade of A, B, C, or F.*

Prerequisite: Minimum score of 420 on SAT Critical Reading or 17 on ACT English. Those without scores will need to complete a placement exam (online) and receive a passing grade to take ENG 123.

HIS 233 U.S. History – Colonization to Reconstruction

3 credits

This course is a survey of the major events and individuals in United States history from Colonization to Reconstruction. Critically examines various topics of interpretive interest in American history such as the coming of the Europeans, Puritanism, religious freedom, the Revolution, slavery, immigration, industrialization, urbanization, the Civil War, and Reconstruction.

MTH 123 Quantitative Reasoning

3 credits

This course applies mathematics to life skill areas for personal and professional use with an emphasis in problem-solving.

Prerequisite: Minimum Score of 440 on SAT Mathematics, 18 on ACT Mathematics, or successful completion of MTH 107 with a grade of C- or higher.

***Those without scores will need to complete a placement exam (online) and receive a passing grade to take MTH 123.*

NWT 113 New Testament Survey

3 credits

This course is a panoramic view of the chief events, prominent characters, main themes and salient teachings of each New Testament book in relation to its historical, geographical and cultural contexts.

OLT 123 Old Testament Survey

3 credits

This course is a study of the historical settings, literary features, authorship, theological teachings, and general content of the books of the Hebrew Bible. This survey provides a factual and practical groundwork for further studies in the Old Testament.

PSY 223 Introduction to Psychology

3 credits

This course is an introduction to the basic concepts of human behavior, motivation, emotion and personality, and a survey of the contemporary psychological field.

SCI 123 General Biology

3 credits

This course is an introduction to biology. Topics covered include basic chemistry, cell structure and function, genetics, and biotechnology. Includes an overview of the major groups of organisms with an emphasis on the species that affect human health. Early Childhood Education majors must take corresponding laboratory.

SOC 103 Life Formation

3 credits

This course is a practical study of the classic spiritual disciplines that are essential to lifelong spiritual formation from a Pentecostal perspective. The course emphasizes intentional and holistic applications in daily living.
